

COMMUNITY PLANNING AND EPIDEMIOLOGY (CPEP)

ABSTRACT

A core element central to both community planning and public health is the built environment, which includes human-designed and built surroundings that provide the settings for all aspects of human life, ranging from buildings and homes to parks and recreation facilities. A well-planned community includes aspects of public health, while the public's health requires healthy facilities and a built environment that supports and promotes healthy living.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- A Bachelor's degree from an accredited institution
- Minimum 3.0 undergraduate GPA
- Statement of Purpose
- Transcript(s)
- TOEFL/IELTS/PTE (international graduate students (<https://gradschool.umd.edu/admissions/english-language-proficiency-requirements/>))

PROGRAM-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

- Statement of purpose and objectives, including career and educational goals, professional experience, and areas of interest and how the dual degree program will help you achieve your career goals
- At least one undergraduate (bio)statistics course. Other quantitative courses or evidence of data analysis experience may be considered.
- Letters of Recommendation (3)
- CV/Resume
- Writing Samples (optional, up to 2)
- Portfolio PDF Upload (optional)
- Must be recommended for admission by both programs to pursue a dual degree.

There are no restrictions on applicants' previous fields of study, and we indeed encourage academic heterogeneity in all respects.

Note for applicants with foreign credentials:

Evidence of English Language proficiency is required if the applicant does not hold a degree from a U.S. institution or from one of the English-speaking countries listed on the Graduate School website (<https://gradschool.umd.edu/admissions/english-language-proficiency-requirements/>).
